Staff will continue their grade level meetings to discuss and plan for successful practices in the areas of literacy working collaboratively with administration and the literacy coach in their examination of the Common Core, the district's diagnostic measures, and district and building goals in the area of Language Arts/Literacy.
- 2. Pre -Kindergarten to Grade Four staff will participate in a professional learning community based on David Burgess text, <u>Teach Like A Pirate</u>. Staff will discuss and explore practical methods and innovative ideas for maximizing student engagement.
- 3. Administration has continued its implementation bottom lines in the area of language arts/literacy including, but not limited to:
 - Teaching Point posted which focuses on instructional strategy rather than activity
 - Meeting area to accommodate the whole class
 - Desks clustered in groups of four to six to facilitate collaborative work

 - Continual maintenance and deliberate use of word walls

Report to the Superintendent For the Board of Education For the Month of October, 2015

I. SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

October 14, 2015 was designated FHS Testing Day

Approximately 600 9th grade students participated in a practice PSAT exam, sponsored by Kaplan Test Prep. The practice test simulated an actual national assessment and mirrored the redesigned PSAT and is being used to provide students with a gauge of their skills and knowledge for future high school standardized assessments. The students were able to keep the exam booklets as a reference once their test results were obtained.

Approximately 924 10th and 11th grade students were administered the PSAT/NMSQT. This assessment has numerous benefits including the identification of 11th graders for the National Merit Scholarships, prepare students for SAT testing in the spring of their junior year, as well as to demonstrate proficiency in math and language arts as mandated by New Jersey graduation requirements. To fulfill the testing mandate, students must achieve a score of 40 or higher in those sub categories. Scores will be distributed and discussed on December 9, 2015 at 7 pm in the high school auditorium.

Approximately 320 12th grader students took the ASVAB. The ASVAB is a multiple-aptitude battery that measures developed abilities and helps predict future academic and occupational success and is a primary tool employed by the military for applicants. The ASVAB will also serve to fulfill state testing requirements.

<u>Teen PEP</u> performed an outreach for the Freshmen PE classes entitled: "Let's Wait Awhile - Postponing Sexual Involvement.

During the outreach, Teen PEP was able to reach 325 freshmen within the PE classes.

The outreach helped the freshmen identify:

- i. Reasons to wait to have sex
- ii. Characteristics of a healthy relationship
- iii. Effective refusal and negotiation skills

II. PROFESSIONAL ACTIVITIES - STAFF

A study and discussion of Franklin High School's "Youth in Action" (Youth Participatory Action Research) will be presented at the upcoming conference, The College and University Faculty Assembly (CUFA) of the National Council for the Social Studies (NCSS) in New Orleans, LA on November 11 to researchers, teacher educators, teachers-in-training, and civic educators. Youth in Action has been a collaborative project that has involved the dedicated efforts of crossdisciplinary teachers— Farah Hussain (ESL), Maureen Guzman (ESL), Fran Bardusco (ESL), Sana BenNacef (Social Studies), and Steve Virgone (Social Studies)-students, and administrators over the past three years. Since its inception, it has empowered both our ELL and non-ELL students to have a stronger, more articulate voice in Franklin High School, and has been critical in training students to be young civic leaders. Our students have studied race theory. approached the problems they face from a complex perspective, and completed a deeply continuous and interactive action research project. Each year, the students have been invited to Rutgers University to present a focused final project to university faculty and key leaders at the NJ Department of Education. They also presented professional development, and gave a student-led workshop to Rutgers University teacher-educators and pre-service teachers on their experiences as ESL students and their engagement in FHS via Youth in Action, two years ago. This project brings together students of all experiences and backgrounds, and is not limited to our so-called "star-pupils." The experience garnered through this project has been invaluable to all involved.






