


Total Number of Office Discipline Referrals


Franklin High School & Road to Success





- >Staff training for PBIS model at FHS





ODR Percentages 2018







Franklin Middle Schools Hamilton Street Campus & Sampson G. Smith/RTS ODR Percentages by Location Comparison




FMS/HCS & FMS/SGS Interventions

- > Partnering Parent Leadership Academy





ODR Percentages for All Elementary Schools



Elementary School Interventions

- ➤ Teachers have access to training and support in the area of classroom management, Social & Emotional Learning, and Morning Meetings
- Additional Safety Officer to help supervise the areas of cafeteria and playground
- Interventions targeted during transportation include:
 - ongoing training/reinforcement of expectations for bus drivers
 - routine surveillance monitoring of bus runs
 - designation of student peer leaders on the bus
 - rotation of bus safety officers as needed
- Use of PBS to improve school culture climate
- Partnering Parent Leadership Academy

What is Harassment Intimidation & Bullying (HIB)

- Acts or actions that have the effect of insulting, demeaning, creating a hostile educational environment or causing physical and/or emotional harm to students
- HIB can be a single incident involving behavior directed at an individual or group of individuals because of their membership in a protected class

- School Safety Team
 - One at each school lead by the Principal

HIB Reporting For Students & Parents

- ✓ Go to District Website and select "School Safety Harassment Intimidation and Bullying" under Shortcuts
- ✓ Select the "Anonymous Reporting" Link
- ✓ Complete HIB Reporting Form
 - Fill out all information in each box
 - Including the Appropriate School
 - Contact information is optional but encouraged
- Click "Submit" and the information will be sent to the HIB Specialist of the school chosen in the report.

BOE Member Responsibilities

- Report any alleged incident of HIB that you see or hear about to the Superintendent or District Anti Bullying Coordinator
- Participate in the hearing process for any HIB appeals
- Review the outcome of all District HIB investigations
- Follow the Review of the District HIB Investigation and at the next Board Meeting, vote to:
 - > Approve
 - Modify or
 - > Reject

...the Superintendent's actions regarding that HIB report.

Internet Safety Protection

The **Children's Internet Protection Act**, the Neighborhood Children's Internet Protection Act (CIPA/NCIPA), requires school districts to:

- **install technology protection** that block and/or filter material considered obscene, depicts child pornography, is harmful to minors such as images which show an unhealthy or indecent interest in nudity, sex, or excretion and other Internet material that the Board determines is inappropriate for minors;
- address access by minors to inappropriate matter on the Internet/WWW;
- address safety and security of minors when using direct electronic communications, i.e. e-mail, chat rooms;
- address unauthorized access, i.e. hacking;
- address unauthorized disclosures, use, and dissemination of personal identification information regarding minors; and
- provide measures designed to restrict minors' access to materials harmful to minors.

The CIPA/NCIPA, requires school districts to develop and ensure education is provided to every student regarding appropriate online behavior, including students interacting with other individuals on social networking sites and/or chat rooms, and cyberbullying awareness and response.

Internet Safety Protection

Franklin Township Public Schools:

- **protects students' use** of electronic communication by assigning student email accounts which are processed through the district server;
- has a filter which blocks inappropriate material from school based computers and chrome books and which requires an adult log in to override;
- utilizes Go Guardian to alert administration of student attempts to access inappropriate material, when warranted, these reports are typically responded to the following school day.

Students in grades 3 - 12 are provided education via assemblies and course work regarding appropriate online behavior including the use of social networking sites, and cyberbullying awareness and response.

Additionally, descriptions and consequences for technology based offenses are listed in the district Student Code of Conduct.
